- Editorial Assistants (graduate students and recent PhDs encouraged to nominate themselves)



- SecretaryTreasurer



### **Election Preview**

Between 15 March and 15 April 2007, the membership will be asked to vote on a very slight amendment to the new mission statement:

- **Current Mission Statement:** The current statement reads: "GEMELA strives to unite scholars across traditional disciplinary boundaries through its focus on women's cultural production in medieval and early modern Spain and colonial Latin America through 1800. Our purpose is to disseminate information and knowledge about women and their role as cultural producers. Our conferences and publications encourage excellence in teaching and research based on all interdisciplinary approaches related to our principal field of inquiry."
- **Proposed Revision:** "GEMELA strives to unite scholars across traditional disciplinary boundaries through its focus on women's cultural production in medieval and early modern Spain and colonial Latin America through 1800. Our purpose is to distribute information and knowledge about women and their role as cultural producers. Our conferences and publications encourage teaching and research based on all approaches related to our principal field of inquiry."
- **Explanation**: The revision will substitute "distribute" for "disseminate", and deletes "excellence in" and "interdisciplinary" in the last sentence for the sake of clarity and non-sexist language.
